

Leadership Message: Executive Director



Claudio Ruiz Pilarte

Being my first Annual General Meeting as Executive Director for CCS, I would like to thank the Board for granting me the privilege of leading an organization that is very dear to me. I would also like to extend this gratitude to all the staff at CCS who welcomed me very warmly and supported me as I transitioned into the position.

This year has been a time of transition and reflection. Gradually coming out of the isolation that the COVID-19 pandemic imposed on everyone, and returning to a more conventional model of service has given us all a renewed sense of community, an appreciation for the work we do in the community, a recognition of how successfully the organization adjusted to changing conditions, and a determination to project the organization's mission well into the future.

This year CCS was a finalist for two not-for-profit awards in the mental health and diversity, equality, and inclusion category. This national-level competition is organized and awarded by Charity Village. On March 10th, 2023 the long-anticipated CCS Gala took place, and it was an evening filled with success stories, singing, dancing, and networking. We are grateful for the Board's support, table sponsors, and empowering sponsor, Loretto Sisters. We successfully reached our fundraising goal of \$30,000, which will be utilized for our Women Support Services programs.


We started a community assessment to learn about community assets, service gaps, and growth opportunities for Mississauga, Brampton, and Durham. Through this assessment, we were able to determine the need for a new site which will be located at the Cedarbrae Mall. We anticipate the new site will be operating by early 2024.

A delegation led by Minister Giles met with representatives from our Refugee Sponsorship Training Program (RSTP), a refugee sponsoring organization staff, and a Canadian sponsoring group at the Australian consulate in Toronto on December 12, 2022. The purpose of the meeting was to provide Minister Giles with a better understanding of the various aspects of Canada's refugee program. RSTP staff shared our experience of training and supporting refugee sponsors and shared materials created to help refugees' sponsors

CCS proposals were accepted to present at the Metropolis Summit in October 2022. CCS representatives attended and presented in person some of our best practice models on New Ways of Service Delivery Through Technology and Diversity, Equity and Inclusion: Practices, Policies, and Programs.

Throughout its history, CCS has played a very dynamic role in the non-profit ecosystem of the city and the province. Considering the increased importance of immigration for Canada's future, and the planned arrival of up to 550,000 newcomers per year by 2025, CCS is determined to continue to play a pivotal role in the successful integration of newcomers by providing essential services that assist them in the process of re-starting a new life in Canada. Our long history has proven it and the solid commitment of our staff guarantees that CCS will continue to play a leadership role in the sector.

We aid newcomers in Canada for **successful integration**. Our services provide personalized support and group sessions in **30+ languages** across the GTA



Refugee & Other Support

We assist **groups across Canada** in sponsoring refugees globally, lead community-driven efforts to streamline resources for **effective newcomer integration** and have a **robust volunteer** base supporting GTA's newcomers.



Learn English & Employment Support

We provide **English classes for all levels**, helping refugees and immigrants settle, **secure jobs**, access services and **integrate smoothly**.



Women & Youth Services

We offer **confidential support for newcomer women and children** facing domestic abuse ensuring safety, housing and mental health. Settlement workers in schools assist newcomer youth **and families with community integration** and school support.

- Provides personalized settlement support and self-serve resources, aiding newcomers to become self-sufficient and foster community connections.

Families in Settlement together held its first **Annual Check it out Family Wellness Fair** where newcomer families with young children and special needs received information about available services. Speakers included from City of Toronto – Park and Rec, Strides Toronto, Scarborough Boys and Girls Club.

Financial Literacy

- Empowers confident money management through individual and group sessions, helping newcomers understand their finances, alleviating stress, and instilling confidence in achieving personal goals and family needs.

- Assists LGBTQ+ newcomers addressing unique settlement challenges; connecting them with resources and creating a smoother settlement

Newcomer Settlement Program

- Facilitates newcomers' engagement in all facets of Canadian social, economic, and cultural life.

Our Impact

In 2016, Gagandeep Singh Chawla and Jasleen Kaur Chawla arrived in Canada, connecting with settlement worker Daljeet Bhatti. Since then, they consistently sought help for various settlement needs, from family benefits and employment assistance to utilizing services like the furniture bank, information sessions, and commissioner of oath services.

➤ CCS offers a comprehensive range of Mental Health & Wellness support services, featuring short-term Crisis Counselling, a Women's Wellness Program, and youth mental health support. These services are delivered through anti-oppressive, linguistically and culturally sensitive, client-centered approaches, assisting individuals in their mental health journey during the settlement process.

Our Impact

Over 6 months, Laila (pseudonym) underwent counselling that boosted her self-confidence, helped her navigate an unhealthy relationship, and equipped her with coping and conflict-resolution skills. This transformation improved her self-esteem, enhanced her relationship with her spouse, and inspired her to explore new educational and entrepreneurial ventures. Throughout this journey, she remained profoundly grateful for the support provided by CCS.

CCS Mental Health Highlights

- Women's Wellness Program implemented a **4-week, hybrid Women's Wellness Summer Café to address needs of women**. The Café offered peer-led English conversation sessions, promoted mental health and well-being, and fostered connections with services and peers.
- As part of our new partnership with **OCASI Mental Health Promotion Project**, we piloted a **Youth led Mental Health Peer Support** project where four immigrant youth led mental health related discussions.
- CCS is thrilled to **partner with Punjabi Community Health Services** to certify CCS Crisis workers in Mental Health First Aid, enhancing front-line support in Peel Region and **promoting mental well-being within the community**.

Our Programs

Language Instructions for Newcomers in Canada (LINC)

► Provides support to newcomers through free English classes at both the Toronto and Peel locations. This cater to language levels from beginner to advanced, effectively reducing barriers and facilitating a seamless settlement process across the GTA. Recognizing its students' needs, the CCS LINC program also offers child minding services.

LINC Post Pandemic

We achieved a successful reopening of LINC classes, focusing on safety and a smooth shift to in-person activities while keeping the well-being of students and families a top priority. Acknowledging the program's hybrid approach, we responded to the need for digital and written literacy assistance. Through implementation of a Virtual Services & Access Navigator, helping with technology and digital literacy, alongside a Literacy Assistant to enhance writing skills.

Highlight

The Brampton Newcomers Fair **brought together various community partners** to provide essential information and services for newcomers to integrate into their new community. CCS, among other organizations, had a booth where they **shared details about our services.**

Highlight

Due to high demand within the Afghan Community, we introduced **a morning literacy program** at our Toronto location. This class specifically **caters to Afghan newcomers** with limited English proficiency.

Employment Support

Our Impact

The employment program equips clients with tools to explore and start businesses in Canada. One client, learning from a friend in the commercial cleaning industry, regularly consulted with a employment worker to hone her business idea. By March 2023, she successfully launched her own cleaning business in Ontario. The program further aided her in enhancing her online presence, marketing, and operations, with specialized support in social media and business initiation.

New to CCS

In **collaboration with York University's Asian Business Management Program (ABMP)**, we launched a new program this year to meet client needs: "**Connecting Newcomers with Jobs in Ontario's Supply Chain Operations Workforce.**" This program provided virtual skills training, workplace experience, and **job search assistance to 102 newcomers.** By the end of the year **52% of participants secured employment in their field.**

Highlight

Newcomer Women Project **supported 42 newcomer women** with minimal or no Canadian work experience offering insights into Canadian workplace culture, virtual soft skills training, **job shadowing, placements, and personalized coaching** to prepare them for the Canadian labor market.

Our Programs

The Settlement and Education Partnerships in Toronto (SEPT)

- A school-based program helping newcomer students and their families seamlessly integrate into their community and understand the educational system.

Women's Support Services and Transitional Housing Support Program

- We assist newcomer women experiencing domestic violence with in-person counseling, shelter, housing, legal aid, and emotional support. Our program also offers short-term and long-term goal-oriented counseling to help them understand and cope with the impacts of abuse.

Women and Youth Services

Highlight

Our Summer Enrichment Program engaged **50 newcomer children and youth through sports sessions** encompassing activities such as basketball, soccer, circus arts, rock climbing, and boxing.

Highlight

We have developed a comprehensive, **tailored toolkit** designed to aid professionals who handle **Gender-Based Violence (GBV)** and **Intimate Partner Violence (IPV)** cases. This resource **streamlines** the **process** of conducting needs assessments, work plans, and making referrals. We've conducted workshops for our settlement workers and aim to extend these sessions to more community organizations.

Our Impact

María (pseudonym) a 38-year-old Venezuelan woman sought our help amidst an abusive marriage that spanned continents. Arriving as a refugee in 2007 and gaining immigrant status in 2013, she yearned for a better life in Canada. After enduring emotional and verbal abuse, she found the courage to seek help amid the pandemic's challenges. Our agency became her refuge, guiding her towards safety planning, legal aid, and the path to justice. With determination, she secured full custody of her children, left her abuser, and found employment. Her journey stands as a testament to the power of support, resilience, and a brighter future forged through empowerment.

Our Programs

The Refugee Sponsorship Training Program (RSTP)

- Enhances Canada's refugee sponsorship and resettlement efforts with training, support, and information sharing to sponsoring groups via online sessions, in-person training, inquiries assistance, and publications.

Toronto East Quadrant Local Immigration Partnership (TEQLIP)

- Improves newcomer integration in Scarborough by fostering local strategies, efficient resource use, and partnerships. It unites diverse experts to cultivate a more inclusive and adaptive environment for newcomers.

Scarborough Newcomer Settlement Collective

- In partnership with TEQLIP, this is a 2-year effort to develop a community-based newcomer service model in Scarborough, uniting various stakeholders.

Highlight

RSTP is a vital player in Canada's refugee sponsorship and resettlement efforts. We provided training on key topics, such as **policies for Afghan refugee sponsorship** that engaged **4,406 participants**. We also **supported** Government Assisted Refugee **referral partners** and Economic Mobility Pathways Pilot program participants, ensuring everyone is **well-informed** about IRCC's **evolving policies** and programs.

Our Programs

Service Delivery Data Hub

- Facilitates pooled data collection and analysis for improved newcomer service in Scarborough. It offers bi-annual trend reports for informed decisions and provides data analytics training to newcomer agencies.

Refugee Sponsorship Support Program (SSP)

- Offers pro bono legal assistance for those privately sponsoring refugees. Aiding in the initial application process and we connect sponsors, with sponsorship experts and pro bono lawyers.

Volunteer Program

- Has thrived for two consecutive years following the pandemic. Dedicated volunteers and students have played a pivotal role in sustaining our services for newcomer, immigrant, and refugee communities across the GTA and beyond.

Refugee and Other Services

The project now includes **19 organizations**, has undertaken **two data collections**, released **three Scarborough Newcomer Needs & Trends reports**, and hosted **three capacity-building workshops** covering newcomer data resources, Microsoft Excel for data management, and Microsoft Power BI Desktop.

A total of **38 lawyers** offered pro-bono assistance to **60 sponsoring groups**, aiding them in supporting **85 applications** that encompassed the sponsorship of **259 refugees**.

Newcomer Vaccine Engagement Project

From April to December 2022, CCS joined with the Jane and Finch Centre, to **enhance vaccine awareness among Scarborough's Black and Latin American communities**. **Community ambassadors** played a pivotal role in creating safe spaces for vaccine discussions, promoting access, building confidence, and amplifying health messaging. This **tackled accessibility barriers** and **ensured reliable information sharing**. Ongoing **outreach and community engagement** efforts allowed us to connect with **796 newcomers**, sharing accurate vaccine insights.




